A Celebration for the Life of Dawn Lever

5th September 1944 - 4th July 2015



Dawn was born in Taunton, Somerset where her parents were evacuated during the war; she was the eldest of three children. The family returned to London and settled in Streatham, Dawn attended Swaffield Road Primary School and was one of only two who won a "scholarship" Her designated school was Lady Margaret's Grammar School in Parson's Green, where pupils were required to wear boaters and gloves, the school motto was "The lot has fallen to me, in a fair ground. Yea I have a goodly heritage" - later in life she came to believe, it was a goodly heritage. Dawn completed her "O" and "A" levels but decided against university and applied for an Apprenticeship at Peter Jones, where she obtained a City and Guilds in Retail Distribution and became Head Buyer in the Lighting Department.

She moved to New York to work as an au pair for a year, then took a tour of the USA, discovering San Francisco and a love of the arts in all its many and varied forms.

In 1967 on her return to London she was accepted at Philippa Fawcett Teacher Training College, where she was one of the first to obtain a B. Ed. During those four years she travelled extensively in Europe with Vic, her future husband. Their two daughters were born in 1974 and 1978 and there are two grandchildren.

Dawn taught at Cricket Green Primary School and took an Open University course for Children with Special Needs which she used when she worked at the Links and Carew Manor schools; she had a particular love for those children.

Dawn was very active in local politics, a member of the Labour Party, a founder member of the Sutton Women's Centre, a member of CND and Amnesty International, a campaigner for Women's Rights. She donated to Voluntary Service Overseas to support a Doctor.

2001 found her in Greensborough, North Carolina, working as an exchange teacher in a public school, experiencing the differences in education for those children and the racial discrimination.

In 2007 she went to Kenya working as a volunteer for an education charity, supporting the local black teachers and volunteers.

Dawn led the 20th Century Poetry Group for U3A, she read 'Today' by Billy Collins at the most recent AGM in May.

Dawn was diagnosed with Leukaemia in December 2014 and underwent three months of chemotherapy at St. Helier Hospital. The disease appeared to be in remission but it returned, she was admitted to the Royal Marsden Hospital and died on the 4th July 2015.

Dawn was an educator, she worked for the empowerment of women and inspired children.

Dawn was a woman full of compassion, so many acts of personal kindness, which came from a love of other people; a good friend to so many.

U3A Outing to Sandwich and Walmer Castle

In mid-July we went on a coach trip to Sandwich and Walmer Castle. Sandwich was a Saxon stronghold, first mentioned in AD664 and later became one of the Cinque Ports. It is situated on the banks of the River Stour on the Kent coast. Sandwich contains the highest number of listed buildings per head of population in the country and was the first town in Britain to have a preservation order placed on the whole town. It is the most complete medieval town in England.

We were lucky with the weather as we wandered around the pretty timbered buildings and quaint little shops. There were a variety of restaurants and cafés where we could stop for coffee or lunch. There was plenty to see, with four historic churches, a museum attached to the Guildhall, a windmill built in c1760; the oldest restored windmill in Kent. Richborough Fort was established as a military base after the Roman invasion of 43AD. The gardens at the Salutation Manor House are an oasis of tranquillity and river trips were available, if one had the time. You would really need to spend a

few days in Sandwich to be able to enjoy it to the full but it was lovely to have a glimpse of what was available.

After lunch we returned to our coach for the second part of our trip; a visit to Walmer Castle in Deal. The castle is complete, compact and furnished comfortably in a very homely fashion. It was easy to see how the Duke of Wellington lived there in the 19th Century. There was a lovely sea view from the first floor terrace, where deckchairs were placed between the cannon. Or there was the option of walking in the sheltered gardens, or just sitting by the lily pond, relaxing in the sunshine, and having a final cup of tea before our journey home. Our homeward trip took us through Dover, where we witnessed 'Operation Stack', with hundreds of lorries parked along the motorway on the way in to Dover. Many thanks to Maggs for organising this lovely day.

A STAMPED ADDRESSED ENVELOPE must be enclosed when booking by post in order that a receipt can be sent which confirms a place on the outing.

An **EMERGENCY CONTACT** is requested as, without this, the organiser would not know how or who to inform should a member have an accident or be taken ill, especially if they were unable to travel home on the coach. We hope this shows an assurance of care, and is not perceived as intrusive. All applications are treated as confidential and are destroyed after the outing or theatre trip.

SCILL is a community charity which offer a range of services for the *whole* community and specialising in disability

It is located in Sutton, the rooms and space can be rented out for meetings or parties. Blue Badge parking is available as well as accessible toilets and a "Changing Places" room that can be accessed 24/7.

SCILL provides free, confidential information & advice, on any issues – including health matters such as signposting you to local care services and explaining how to access them, being discharged from hospital and/or finding an emergency dentist; joining local social groups, lunch clubs or art clubs etc; highlighting transport options to visit London etc; finding a local gardener; and even hiring a skip! Ask us anything.

Classes at SCILL - include Computers; Pottery; Art; Craft.

The Gymnasium is open to anyone – to use either on your own for £20 a month or with support from a trained fitness instructor for £33 a month

We offer a basic Footcare service for just £15 or full for £21

Activities on the Road – SCILL have a number of groups that meet at various locations around the Borough.

Sherwood Café – provides a range of sandwiches & hot meals, it is open Monday to Friday 9.30am – 2pm

SCILL have teamed up with **Citizens Advise Bureau** to offer a fantastic service for people who live or work in LBS and have a long term health condition or disability.

We work with Sutton Shopmobility to sell small items of disability equipment and RADAR keys for access to all locked accessible toilets in the UK.


