Vision and Mission Statement

OUR VISION

is to make Lifelong Learning, through the experience of U3A, a reality for all third agers.

OUR MISSION

declares our purpose as an organisation and serves as the standard against which we weigh our actions and decisions. It is to:

- Facilitate the growth of the movement.
- Provide support for management and learning in U3As.
- Raise the profile of the U3A movement.
- Promote the benefits of learning in later life through self help learning.

THE PRINCIPLES OF THE U3A MOVEMENT

The U3A Movement is non-religious and non-political and has three main principles:

The Third Age Principle

- Membership of a U3A is open to all in their third age, which is defined not by a particular age but by a period in life in which full time employment has ceased.
- b) Members promote the values of lifelong learning and the positive attributes of belonging to a U3A.
- Members should do all they can to ensure that people wanting to join a U3A can do so.

The Self-help Learning Principle

- a) Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire; by the members, for the members.
- No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the b) prime motive, not qualifications or awards.
- There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers; they are all U3A members.

The Mutual Aid Principle

- Each U3A is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of The Third a) Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the U3A Movement.
- b) No payments are made to members for services rendered to any U3A.
- Each U3A is self-funded with membership subscriptions and costs kept as low as possible. C)
- d) Outside financial assistance should only be sought if it does not imperil the integrity of the U3A movement.

January 2014

A brief outline of the talk given by Lin Jonas, Senior Executive Officer of the Third Age Trust at the one-day Network Conference held in April this year at East Grinstead.

Lin gave an excellent account of our present situation and of planned improvements for the future. This a not a summary of what was said but does give many of the main highlights of a long presentation.

The U3A Movement – Now and in the Future

We are currently in very good health with 927 U3As having 322,095 members and 41 U3As formed in the last year. The new website became operational in September 2013. On-line courses have been re-vamped, advanced learning groups have been created and more subject advisors have been recruited.

The third-party insurance cover has been raised from £5m to £10m.

The Resource Centre is being used by 94% of U3As and they send out over 4,800 packages each year.

The National Office needs more staff to cope with the increasing workload and succession planning is needed as several staff members are in the age range to be able to consider retirement.

Despite the rising state retirement age, from 60 for women and 65 for men, to 68 for everyone over the next few years, there is still a strong need to provide U3A opportunities for people as they retire. New and younger members are essential to keep U3As vibrant and the new members generally have good IT skills which helps the U3A and other members. Currently male life expectancy increases are greater than for women. The Trust hopes to participate in research on ageing, health and well-being.

The many national events are proving very successful. The Royal Institution has offered a second afternoon of lectures in September. We are becoming well known in the field and now institutions are approaching the Trust with new offers of events.

Remember we are a Learning Organisation based on the principles set out by the Founders. The April issue of Third Age Matters will have had a summary of those principles for all to read and appreciate afresh.

ART GALLERY GUIDED TOURS - by Ann Davies, BA, MA

24 September - The National Gallery

Trafalgar Square, London. WC2N 5DN

This tour will look at what the Renaissance meant visually north of the Alps. As a result we will consider works by artists such as Jan van Eyck, Holbein and Dürer referencing influences from the south including Titian and Leonardo da Vinci.

15 October - Courtauld Gallery,

We will brush against their influences and the art of Titian as well as acknowledge the work of their contemporaries such as Caravaggio and his followers.
