# Frank Gilbart

Beloved Husband of Joan, loving, generous Father to Joy, Helen and James. Grandpa to six cherished Grandchildren

Frank Gilbart who died recently was one of the original founder members of Sutton V3A, together with Joan Sene, Bob Taverner, Ted Berg and Frieda Wright.

The initial meeting was in 1986 at Sutton Library. Notices went out and the meeting was publicised. 70 people were expected to attend and 200 people turned up for the meeting! After the first meeting in 1986 Sutton U3A was registered in 1987 and the first constitution was registered with the Charity Commission.

Franks hosted and ran two groups at his home. His first love was Classical Music and he had a vast collection of music that was catalogued and took up a full wall in his music room. He ran the music group until about five years ago when Charles Stow took on the leadership. Frank was also leader and host of the History A Group for many years.

I first met Frank in 2000 when I joined the History Group. He was a regular presenter of information and was very interesting and knowledgeable about whatever subject he presented.

Regarding his personal life, he was married to Joan for over fifty years and had a loving family. He served in the Second World War and was a Fighter Controller in the Far East. Along with other members who had served in the war Frank gave a talk about his experiences to U3A about five years ago. After he left the Air Force he joined the Post Office and worked there for many years.

On a personal note I found Frank to be a lovely man and a perfect gentleman and he will be very much missed by all who knew him.

## A Walk Through the Inns of Court, Holborn, followed by lunch Monday, 27<sup>th</sup> April, 2015



At Chancery Lane Underground Station, on a not too chilly Spring morning, 29 members met our Guide, **Ian Bevan**, for the planned morning's walk round the four Inns of Court which are situated in three areas stretching from just north of High Holborn to the Embankment.

The four Inns are legal societies which have the sole right in England and Wales to admit law students as barristers, meaning that they can prosecute and defend cases in court. As we went round the Courts we saw that they are all stunning examples of Gothic architecture

The first Inn we visited was Gray's Inn – this was built in the13th Century on the site of the medieval manor of Portpoole ("the market by the Pool") and the Gray's family owned it until 1506. Within Gray's Inn is South Square which like so many historical buildings, was largely destroyed in the Blitz but fortunately was rebuilt in the 1950's to the original plans.

We next visited Lincoln's Inn which was founded in mid-14<sup>th</sup> Century by the Earl of Lincoln who brought together a society of lawyers and the Inn was built on the site of his palace. Lincoln's Inn claims to have the earliest written legal rules, called the Black Books which date from 1422.

Our next port of call was an Inn called The Temple which it takes its name from the Knights Templar who occupied the site in the 12<sup>th</sup> Century. Some of the land

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was offered to lawyers as accommodation, hence the word Inn". Within this lovely complex the original Temple Church was built but unfortunately all that has survived is the Crypt in which the secret initiation ceremonies were conducted.

We next followed our guide to the Inner Temple (another Inn) which has been almost completely rebuilt, having been destroyed in the Great Fire of 1666 and again in the Blitz, but all rebuilt to the original plans with very beautiful gardens.

Lastly we arrived at our "watering hole", the Middle Temple which includes a number of squares where many barristers have their chambers, but the highlight of Middle Temple is Middle Temple Hall built 1562 – 1570, described as *'the finest Elizabethan building in central London'* which boasts one of the finest hammer-beam roofs. It was in this awesome building that 20 members enjoyed a lovely 5 course lunch with our lunch companions being many members of the legal profession, but unfortunately we did not see any judges lunching – they usually sit at the "top table".

Everyone had a wonderful "history lesson" with lan giving us the benefit of his considerable knowledge and, with this being followed by our magnificent lunch, we all left for home feeling we had experienced a great day.

#### Visit to the Mansion House

In January I received an invitation for a group visit to the Mansion House for 40 people on Monday, 23<sup>rd</sup> March. This came completely out of the blue. We had made several requests for a visit over many years but we had not had any success. So I accepted and then set about finding a group who had never been and who could go on that day.

We were welcomed by a very Welsh gentleman, whose accent was so strong we had difficulty understanding him at first. He had a wonderful sense of humour and was a good guide. The Mansion House was available that day because the Mayor of the City of London was abroad on business. The Georgian Mansion House was built in the Palladian style in 1737 by the architect George Dance the Elder. Many changes to the building have taken place, including the roofing of the courtyard. The Mayor has private apartments, his staff offices and many civic, ceremonial and large entertainments take place in the public rooms which are sumptuously and beautifully decorated and furnished, with some lovely paintings.

The atmosphere of the Mansion House is very grand but almost homely for the Mayor of the City of London. It was a privilege to visit.

In the Shuttleworth Old Warden Aerodrome there is an awe-inspiring collection of aircraft and vehicles from the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. There is an engineering workshop to be visited; a collection of mostly Edwardian vehicles and also motorcycles and bicycles.

The Swiss Garden is adjacent to the Collection and has recently benefitted from a £3.5m restoration. It is an extensive, picturesque Regency Swiss Garden with surprises and vistas revealed at every turn, including alpine hills, shrubbery, trees, paths, little lakes and follies, with the Swiss Cottage at the centre.



There is a restaurant and a Visitor Centre with a gift shop.


The cost of this visit, which includes the coach, driver's gratuity and the entrance to both attractions is £29.15 per person.

#### 11.30 a.m. Thursday 10 September 2015

Leighton House, Holland Park, London

This was home to Frederic, Lord Leighton and this exotic venue now houses a wonderful collection of his paintings and drawings. Other works by artists such as Edward Pointer and John Everett Millais are also featured in the collection.

#### 11.30 a.m. Wednesday 7 October 2015

The Wallace Collection, Hertford House, Manchester Square, London

The Wallace Collection is a national museum which displays art, furniture and other objects collected in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries by the first of four Marquesses of Hertford and Sir Richard Wallace, the son of the 4<sup>th</sup> Marquess. The collection is displayed at Hertford House, one of the family's London properties in the nineteenth century, which provides a sumptuous setting for the pieces. The tour will consider some of the objects, such as the Sevres porcelain but will focus on the paintings and sculpture.

#### 11.30 a.m. Thursday 12 November

Courtauld Gallery and Prints and Drawings Room, Somerset House, The Strand, London

The Courtauld houses an extensive collection of works from early Renaissance to the late twentieth century. On this visit we will consider some Impressionist and Post-Impressionist paintings. Following a break we shall view a selection of the treasures in the Courtauld Prints and Drawings room.

#### 11.30 a.m. Wednesday 26 November 2015

National Gallery, Trafalgar Square

During this visit we will consider paintings which emerged from the Enlightenment and the Romantic Period. This tour will therefore be very wide ranging, engaging with works by Turner, Stubbs, Wright of Derby and others.

#### 11.30 a.m. Wednesday 9 December 2015

National Gallery, Trafalgar Square

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This is a seasonal tour looking at how the nativity is depicted throughout the ages and in different countries.
